The Capture of Ethan Allen Sept. 24th, 1775

The American invasion of Quebec departed from Ticonderoga on August 28. On September 4, the army had occupied the Île aux Noix in the Richelieu River, a few miles above Fort St. John, which they then prepared to besiege. On September 8, General Schuyler sent now civilian scout Ethan Allen and Massachusetts Major John Brown, who had also been involved in the capture of Ticonderoga, into the countryside between St. John and Montreal to spread the word of their arrival to the habitants and the Indians. They were successful enough in gaining support from the habitants that Quebec's governor, General Guy Carleton, reported that "they have injured us very much".

When he returned from that expedition eight days later, Brigadier General Richard Montgomery had assumed command of the invasion due to Schuyler's illness. Montgomery, likely not wanting the troublemaker in his camp, again sent him out, this time to raise a regiment of French-speaking Canadiens. Accompanied by a small number of Americans, he again set out, traveling through the countryside to Sorel, before turning to follow the Saint Lawrence River up toward Montreal, recruiting upwards of 200 men.

On September 24, he and Brown, whose company was guarding the road between St. John's and Montreal, met at Longueuil, and, according to Allen's account of the events, came up with a plan in which both he and Brown would lead their forces to attack Montreal. Allen and about 100 men crossed the Saint Lawrence that night, but Brown and his men, who were to cross the river at Laprairie, did not. General Carleton, alerted to Allen's presence, mustered every man he could, and, in the Battle of Longue-Pointe, scattered most of Allen's force, and captured him and about 30 men. His capture ended his participation in the revolution until 1778, as he was imprisoned by the British. General Schuyler, upon learning of Allen's capture, wrote, "I am very apprehensive of disagreeable consequences arising from Mr. Allen's imprudence. I always dreaded his impatience and imprudence."



How do conduct a Libertyseed at a Library

Library Step by Step

1. Check your local libraries' website for contact information.
2. Contact the librarian or support person by phone or go to the library and inquire about getting a room reserved. Plan on enough room for 30 people and an hour and a half for the presentation and at least 30 minutes to set up and take down.
3. Find a date that is available with plenty of lead-time for promotion. Then fill out the form for that date. You might also want to include the new Libertyseed Flyers with the form so the library has an idea of what you are doing. These Flyers should be available as of September 2013.
4. Return the form in person and ask the librarian the following;
 - a. Would you be interested in sponsoring and/or promoting this program?
 - b. Does the room have a digital projector, screen and power?
 - c. May I look at the room to see how we might set up?
 - d. When can we get into the room to set up?
 - e. Would you have one of your staff attend the presentation for future support?
- Be prepared to answer questions about what the Three Strikes is all about. Make sure you tell them that the RWVA is non-profit and non political.
5. Promote the presentation by sending/emailing a promotional flyer with the date of your event to your cable TV community calendar, local newspaper community calendar, and any online community calendars you can find. Make sure you ask to post a flyer in the library. Make sure you add the name and address of the library to the flyer. You may also want to contact the local chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, Boy/Girl scouts, perhaps any local history groups, and home school organizations concerning your event.
6. Send a press release to the editor of the local paper.
7. If you are the LibertySeed coordinator request a set of flags, flyers, Bloody Butchery posters etc. through the Shoot Boss board or have your state coordinator do it for you. Make sure you do this far enough in advance to ensure delivery. 4 weeks to be safe.
8. On the date of your presentation arrive early enough to set up your props, power point etc.
9. Have a sign in sheet to gather contacts. Most people don't mind giving you a name and an email.
10. Try to make up and have available business cards with your contact number/email on them.
11. Don't be afraid of standing out in the lobby and encourage people to come to your presentation. I've even circulated through the library with my musket "recruiting" people to come to the presentation. Check with the Library in your area about inert Muskets and if they would be allowed.
