Thomas Hickey from Wiki

Thomas Hickey was a Continental Army soldier in the Revolutionary War, and the first person executed for treason against what would become the United States. Born in Ireland, he came to America as a member of the British Army, but deserted and joined the other side.

He became part of the Life Guard, which protected General Washington, his staff,

and the Army's payroll.

Hickey was later jailed for passing counterfeit money, tried and executed for mutiny and sedition. He was Hanged on June 28th, 1776. During his incarceration he revealed to another prisoner his plans to rejoin the British in their fight against the Continental Army. Hickey was tried after this and during the trial

rumors also surfaced that he was involved in a bigger plot to kidnap Washington, assassinate his officers, and blow up ammunition supplies.

The Civilian Marksmanship Program

"the greatest battle implement ever devised"

The CMP (Civilian Marksmanship Program) dates back to 1903 when Congress approved creation of the DCM (Department of Civilian Marksmanship). The purpose at the time was to provide civilians a way to learn and practice rifle skills for use if needed at a later time for service in the U.S. Military. It was believed that civilians with the popular lever action rifles of the time were not able to sustain an

equivalent rate of fire with the unfamiliar bolt-action Springfield 1903 (the national service arm). Over the years the focus of the program shifted towards youth development through marksmanship training. The U.S. Army administered the program from 1916- 1996. The CMP is a non-profit organization chartered by the Congress but is not a U.S. Government agency. Apart from donations of rifles from

the Army's inventory, the CMP receives no federal funding. Activities of the CMP include shooting competitions and sales of surplus rifles.

A check of the CMP forum this summer revealed that between the DCM and the CMP 400,000 to 500,000 M1 Garands have been sold over the years.

The Battle of Bunker Hill, June 17th, 1775

On the morning of June 17, 1775, the British General Howe woke with all his ships perfectly positioned on the water. He prepared his troops, and they began the trudge up Bunker Hill. When there was not a person in sight on Bunker Hill, they proceeded to Breeds Hill.

Don't fire until you see the whites of their eyes!" Colonel William Prescott said.

When the British were close enough, the command was shouted and the bullet spatter began. British soldiers dropped like ants being sprayed with bug repellent, but they would not give up. After the first battalion, another came. Once again the patriots did not fire until they were close enough to see the whites of their eyes, and the British fell again.

But, upon the third battalion, the Americans were out of ammunition. They were forced to fight with only their bayonets. The British, having received more training, annihilated them. The Americans were forced to retreat, and give up the land to the British.

By the end of the battle, there were estimated to be 1,154 British casualties and 441 American casualties. As a result, the Battle of Bunker Hill, which really took place at Breeds Hill, is often reported as an American victory, when in fact it was a defeat.
